BISHOP VERRYN

In gratitude to Bishop Verryn and a call to address the dangerous living conditions in Bambayi



Some residents from Bambayi, the informal settlement adjacent to Phoenix Settlement, viewed the "mini-cyclone" as an act of retribution from God. They were traumatised with fear when they saw their belongings and parts of their homes flying off while those of their neighbours were intact. After the unrest of July 2021 and the floods of 2022, this extreme weather event was a bit too much to cope with.

Another member of the public who was there said, "I feel very happy with the arrival of the Bishop because now I can even live with people with whom I couldn't before. May God be with him in his methods, and we praise God for his power."

Phoenix Settlement hosted peace processes in 2021, including individual counselling sessions with Bishop Verryn to help in the healing process. In 2022, after the flood, Phoenix Settlement provided shelter to women and children. Bishop Verryn came to help with group and individual trauma and again, now, in 2023 he flew in from Johannesburg to help the people to cope with the trauma as many were struggling to deal with all these catastrophes piled upon each other. It was particularly difficult for young children.

In the words of a community member: "We are so thankful to the Bishop especially for our young children who observed all these tragedies. We were scared that all of this might cause our young ones to grow up with hatred and fear, but the arrival of Bishop has made things return to normal."

The disaster of the fire in Johannesburg threw light on the dangers of congested informal settlements. In Johannesburg it was a high-rise building. In Bambayi, it is a sprawling, densely populated informal settlement. We have experienced those runaway fires and other humanitarian crises. Phoenix Settlement, Gift of the Givers, Bambayi Project and other civil society organisations helped with different forms of tangible aid to the community. But we need the government to play its role in addressing the housing problem so that our people can live in dignity and not at the mercy of "shack lords", "drug lords", and others who wield power over an already extremely vulnerable community.

Historic meeting between the grand-daughter of Ntombi Mbiko, Ongezwa Mbiko, and the grand-daughter of Mahatma Gandhi, Ela Gandhi.

Who was Ntombi Mbiko? A pivotal figure in Bhambayi's history with an honoured legacy - and the road to Gandhiji's Phoenix Settlement bears her name:



- 1994 Peace Deal: Successfully mediated between rival factions
- Bambayi Reconciliation: Played a prominent role until her passing in 2002
- Helping Victims: Committed to aiding political violence survivors
- Peaceful Reconciliation: Focused on promoting peace, housing, and security

Phoenix Settlement honoured Three Phenomenal Women of Bambayi



Mama Anna Mokoena has devoted many years to museum and heritage site management, including over a decade of overseeing exhibits and heritage areas at Phoenix Settlement



Mama Lilian Mokoatle began her career as a caregiver and later expanded her expertise to include over two decades of dedicated work with children at the creche.



Sister Msomi has devoted more than four decades to the Gandhi Clinic, initially joining as a nurse during a period when young doctors provided primary healthcare services at Phoenix Settlement.

Kasturba Gandhi's Imprisonment Anniversary

Asha Ramgobin, **Kasturba's great-granddaughter**, summarised her great grandmother's biography: Gandhi recognised Kasturba's vital support, highlighting her unwavering commitment and assistance in furthering his goals. Her dedication was clear when Gandhi initiated a hospital for bubonic plague-stricken Indians; she rallied women to equip it effectively.

During the Salt March, women were initially excluded from participation, including Kasturba Gandhi. Instead of marching, she traveled from place to place, using various modes of transport, to rally women in picketing liquor stores and promoting the use of homespun cloth. Her dedication earned her the title of a "Satyagraha soldier."

During the "Quit India" campaign in 1942, when **Gandhiji and other speakers were arrested on August 9th**, Kasturba courageously took his place at the rally, aware of the risk of arrest herself. She entrusted her speech to Sushila Nayar, emphasising a call to women to join the struggle regardless of caste or creed, with truth and non-violence as guiding principles. As anticipated, **Kasturba was arrested on the same day**, sensing she might not survive this time. Tragically, she passed away with her head on Gandhiji's lap, who expressed, "If I had to choose a companion for myself life after life, I would choose Ba."





The Inanda Peace March

The Inanda community is grateful to local organisations, including churches, police, radio stations, and the youth who have stood against abuse, violence, and bullying. A successful peace march led by Inanda students from Newtown Comprehensive School and Kasturba Gandhi Primary School expressed their outrage against child exploitation and gender-based violence. We commend all participants for promoting community peace, harmony, and unity.



A Focus on the Economic Aspect of Gandhi's Idea of Swadeshi

For Gandhiji, Swadeshi was essential to address poverty. He believed that encouraging and reviving local industries was essential for economic salvation. For him, this included local people developing what he described as "such a high degree of skill that their articles should command a ready market. Today the villages are dung heaps. Tomorrow they will be like tiny gardens of Eden where dwell highly intelligent folk whom no one can deceive or exploit."

Phoenix Settlement's new education and training center empowers local residents to create valuable items by hand, starting with sewing skills.

Our approach is simple:

- Freedom to choose what to create, quantity, and target audience, without cooperative complexities.
- Independent management of sales process.
- Support provided with donated materials: fabric, needles, threads, beads, workspace.
- Access to tourist market and expert advice when needed.

The success of this opportunity depends on each participant's dedication.

We promote inter-generational learning, where experienced individuals mentor and teach young people. Thuli Ndlela, a member of the Phoenix Settlement team, created the first item at the skills center: a cell phone case. Her mother taught her sewing and beadwork since these skills were not taught in school. Her hand-stitching is exceptionally neat, and Roshan Kooblal, one of her mentors in the computer center, calls it her "hidden talent" discovered through the skills center setup.
